MISSION

The US Affiliate of Emmanuel International Relief and Rehabilitation International (ERRI), Emmanuel International Mission (EIM) participates in meeting the financial, spiritual, and staffing needs of EI field programs around the world. A director of the EIM Board is a member of the ERRI International Council, which is established to provide overall strategic direction and guidance to ERRI field programs. EIM also seeks to educate individuals, faith-based organizations, and evangelical churches on the needs of the poor around the world.

MISSION STATEMENT:

Emmanuel International Mission seeks to transform lives of the poor for now and for eternity by developing partnerships with local, established evangelical churches throughout the world. EIM encourages, strengthens and assists churches to meet the physical and spiritual needs of the poor in their communities in accordance with the Holy Scriptures.

WE ARE

Church Centered – Emmanuel partners with local churches and serves their communities under their authority.

People Centered – Emmanuel's staff takes God's love into towns, villages, and homes.

Impartial – Emmanuel meets the needs of people regardless of their race, gender, color or religion.

OUR MINISTRIES ARE

Self-Reliant – Emmanuel's projects build the self-reliance and dignity of those involved.

Grass Roots – Emmanuel's projects meet basic needs and use simple technology, which is easy to replicate.

Holistic – Emmanuel attends to the needs of the whole person: spiritual, emotional, social, and physical.

PROGRAMS AND ACTIVITIES

BRAZIL: Emmanuel Brazil works in partnership with six churches with outreach into the rural areas of Brazil. This includes the Aguas Formosas Presbyterian, Monte

das Oliveiras Baptist, Janauba Presbyterian, Aracuai AOG, Espinosa Presbyterian, and Porteirinha Presbyterian churches. During the past year, EIM sponsored a clean water project in the "Red Corridor," installing a water purification plant at an irrigation canal, piping clean water over 1 km. to the village. Now, each home has a holding tank and tap at their home. Other mission projects included the Terena Bible Institute, preparing students to minister to the Terena peoples of Western Brazil. Economic self-sufficiency is fostered by sewing classes, child day care centers, student tutoring, evangelism, church planting, and community development in rural areas.

HAITI: EI Haiti works in partnership with the Oeuvre Evangelique Baptist Beshesda church. Bringing hope to the poor people of Haiti, the poorest country in the Americas is the focus of EI's Community Health Project, the Maribial School Project and the Haiti Bible Camp programs.

MALAWI: Emmanuel Malawi works with the Evangelical Baptist Church of Malawi to provide community relief and development programs. Major funding from World Food Programme, UK-DFID, Tear Fund, Development Cooperation Ireland, USAID, and matching donations from individuals around the world provides support for a wide variety of agricultural/food security projects, water/sanitation system rehabilitation, medical intervention, and HIV/AIDS projects in addition to evangelical outreach, pastor and church leadership development, and staff discipleship training.

PHILIPPINES/INDONESIA: EI, incorporated in the Philippines as Emmanuel Relief & Rehabilitation Philippines (ERRP), is registered as a tax-exempt charitable organization. It has three regional offices - Davao, Mindanao on the southernmost island, Bacolod City in the central Visayas, and in Laguna, the main office near Manila. Working through local partnerships, ERRPs projects include health and small-scale community development as well as church development and outreach to the rural poor and minority tribes. The focus is on preventative health care. Livelihood and agricultural training are being done to empower local communities. ERRP also stands ready in case of relief needs in times of crisis, to mobilize resources, medical

personnel and volunteers. During the past year, a major grant from EIM allowed ERRP to undertake the Mindanao Peace Project, a water, sanitation, and community health project in rural Mindanao, providing three communities with clean water and training local partners in sanitation, health and livelihood development.

SOUTH AFRICA: EI's partnership with the Fish Hoek Baptist Church has expanded its outreach to the poor of the community through the Living Hope Centre, primarily its HIV/AIDS ministries. Staff pastors, nurses, lay counselors, and home-based care workers combine to provide a holistic ministry to the poor of the area. Raising HIV/AIDS awareness through counseling and disease prevention workshops are at the core of the effort to increase testing of partners to determine HIV/AIDS status and to encourage practices to prevent infection. Home-based and hospice care are instrument in treating patients and their families. Evangelism efforts in the community are bearing fruit, including an outreach project to support a rural area in the Eastern Cape region, providing training for pastors, evangelists, and Sunday school teachers.

SUDAN: Emmanuel International, in conjunction with the Fellowship for African Relief (FAR) provides community-based services in a growing number of locations in Sudan including Khartoum, Northern Upper Nile, Kosti, Renk and the Nuba Mountain Region Programs include community care, advocacy for people in need, on internally displaced persons and rehabilitation of local communities through capacity building in health care, emergency IDP shelter relief, child and mother nutrition, agricultural development, water/sanitation, and income generation.

TANZANIA: Partnering with the Anglican Diocese of Ruhaha, Emmanuel improved health care support, development of community water and sanitation capacity, and discipleship and outreach training for local congregations. A new secondary school in Kilolo with 200 students is fully accredited by the government. Additional classrooms and dormitories are planned. Water projects in several villages provide rainwater collection and storage capacity for the dry season. Primary health care and nutrition projects expanded in

two communities, and a new US registered nurse missionary was assigned to support improved health services, including HIV/AIDS community awareness and home care in the community. Health and nutrition classes, infant health monitoring, demonstration gardens and household sanitation/disease prevention contribute to improved living conditions and productivity.

UGANDA: EI-Uganda focuses much of its efforts on the war-torn areas of northern Uganda. In conjunction with our partner churches, the Diocese of Kitgum, the Diocese of Northern Uganda, and the Diocese of South Rwenzori, EI Uganda expanded short-term relief programs for displaced families, health and immunization projects as well as providing outreach to street children in Kampala and pastor and lay reader training for local churches. The generous contribution of a US donor provided shoes to children at 10 schools in Northern Uganda, and the EI-Uganda team is using that opportunity to introduce the children and their families to mailbox Bible club discipleship, life skills, and agriculture training.

MILLENIUM WATER ALLIANCE: EIM continued its affiliate membership in the MWA, working in conjunction with other members to advocate the importance of clean water, sanitation and hygiene training to the improvement of rural community health and in the mitigation of the effects of disease on vulnerable populations in developing nations. The Treasurer of EIM's Board of Directors also serves as Treasurer of the MWA USAID and private funding for MWA water projects in Ethiopia and Kenya are important steps towards MWA's goal of providing clean water to 500 million people by 2015.
