## MISSION

Emmanuel International Mission (EIM), the US Affiliate of Emmanuel International Relief and Rehabilitation International (EI), helps meet the financial, spiritual, and staffing needs in EI field programs around the world. An EIM Board Member is a member of the EI International Council, which provides overall strategic direction and guidance to field programs. EIM seeks to educate individuals, faith-based organizations, and evangelical churches on the needs of the poor around the world and promotes partnerships between churches and individuals with EI field teams.

### MISSION STATEMENT:

Emmanuel International Mission seeks to transform lives of the poor for now and for eternity by developing partnerships with local, established evangelical churches throughout the world. EIM encourages, strengthens and assists churches to meet the physical and spiritual needs of the poor in their communities in accordance with the Holy Scriptures.

### WE ARE

- Church Centered** – Emmanuel partners with local churches and serves their communities under their authority.
- People Centered** – Emmanuel’s staff takes God’s love into towns, villages, and homes.
- Impartial** – Emmanuel meets the needs of people regardless of their race, gender, color or religion.

### OUR MINISTRIES ARE

- Self-Reliant** – Emmanuel’s projects build the self-reliance and dignity of those involved.
- Grass Roots** – Emmanuel’s projects meet basic needs and use simple technology, which is easy to replicate.
- Holistic** – Emmanuel attends to the needs of the whole person: spiritual, emotional, social, and physical.

### PROGRAMS AND ACTIVITIES

**BRAZIL:** Emmanuel Brazil works in partnership with the Aguas Formosas Presbyterian, Monte das Oliveiras Baptist, Janauba Presbyterian, Aracuai AOG, Espinosa Presbyterian, and Porteirinha Presbyterian churches to provide outreach to communities in rural Brazil. The “Red Corridor” water purification plant was completed in January. The team continues to provide community training in health, agriculture and livelihood development, opening doors to answer the question, “*why are you helping us?*” The

Terena Bible Institute prepares students to minister to the peoples of Western Brazil. Economic self-sufficiency is fostered by sewing classes for girls and young women, day care centers, student tutoring, community development in rural areas, evangelism, spiritual growth and church planting.

**HAITI:** EI Haiti works in partnership with the Oeuvre Evangelique Baptist Beshesda Church. Bringing hope to the poor people of Haiti through community health projects, the Maribial School Project, and the Haiti Bible Camp programs.

**MALAWI:** EI Malawi works with the Evangelical Baptist Church of Malawi, providing health, livelihood and community relief and development programs in southern Malawi as well as in the Mzuzu and Lilongwe areas. Major funding from European, North American and UN agencies, with matching donations from individuals around the world, support agricultural/food security projects, water/sanitation system rehabilitation, medical intervention, and HIV/AIDS projects. Evangelical outreach, pastor and church leadership development, and staff discipleship training strengthens the church's ability to witness in their communities.

**PHILIPPINES/INDONESIA:** Emmanuel Relief & Rehabilitation Philippines (ERRP), is registered as a tax-exempt charitable organization. It has three regional offices - Davao, Mindanao on the southernmost island, Bacolod City in the central Visayas, and in Laguna, the main office near Manila. Working through local partnerships, key projects include health and small-scale community development as well as church development and outreach to the rural poor and minority tribes, focused on preventative health care. Livelihood and agricultural training empowers families in the local communities. During the past year, the Mindanao Peace Project supported additional projects in rural areas including livelihood training, medical clinics using local medical volunteers, health care education, ministry outreach/training, and the start of home fellowship groups. With the resumption of rebel conflict in the area in August, relief food and supplies were distributed in 4 rural areas, supporting over 600 displaced families.

**SOUTH AFRICA:** EI's partnership with the Fish Hoek Baptist Church provides hope to the greater Capetown area through Living Hope Centre HIV/AIDS ministries. Staff pastors, nurses, lay counselors, and home-based care workers minister to the poor of the area by raising HIV/AIDS awareness through counseling and disease prevention, encouraging testing to determine HIV/AIDS status and encouraging practices to prevent infection. Home-based and hospice care treats patients and their families. Evangelism efforts include an outreach project in rural Eastern Cape region, providing training for pastors, evangelists, and Sunday school teachers.

**SUDAN:** Emmanuel International, in conjunction with the Fellowship for African Relief (FAR) provides community-based services in a growing number of locations in Sudan. Programs include support for displaced peoples (there are nearly 7 million

in Sudan) water resource management in the Nuba Mountains, and developing sustainable food security programs, including fruit, shade tree and construction tree nurseries to promote community self sufficiency, and establishing women's community groups for growing and drying vegetables and fruits, both for family consumption and income generation. Poultry, bee-keeping and cheese-making projects contribute to nutrition sustainability.

**TANZANIA:** Partnering with the Anglican Diocese of Ruhaha, Emmanuel improved health care support, developed community water/sanitation capacity, and provided discipleship/outreach training for local congregations. The church-supported St. Michael's Secondary School in Kilolo serves 300 students and is fully accredited by the government. EI donors contribute to the scholarship program for students needing financial assistance. Water projects in Kilolo, Usolanga, and Uhambingeto ensured clean, sustainable water supplies to 6 villages with over 20,000 residents. Primary health care and nutrition projects in Usolanga village focused on supporting mothers in the care of their children and providing health, sanitation and nutrition lessons in the primary school. Community HIV/AIDS seminars and support of girls' clubs are helping to break the cycle of sexual exploitation of children and young women.

**UGANDA:** EI-Uganda focuses much of its efforts on the war-torn areas of northern Uganda. In conjunction with our partner churches, the Diocese of Kitgum, the Diocese of Northern Uganda, and the Diocese of South Rwenzori, EI Uganda expanded short-term relief programs for displaced families, health and immunization projects as well as providing outreach to street children in Kampala and pastor and lay reader training for local churches. The generous contribution of a US donor provided shoes to children at 10 schools in Northern Uganda, and the EI-Uganda team is using that opportunity to introduce the children and their families to mailbox Bible club discipleship, life skills, and agriculture training.

**MILLENNIUM WATER ALLIANCE:** EIM, an affiliate member of MWA, works in conjunction with other MWA members to advocate the importance of clean water, sanitation and hygiene training to funding organizations. During the last year, MWA initiated new projects to improve rural community health and mitigate the effects of disease on vulnerable populations in several developing nations. Multinational and private funding for MWA water projects continue to reach towards our goal to provide clean water to 500 million people by 2015. The EIM Treasurer also serves as Treasurer of the MWA.
